

Web-based Supports for Pre-Service and In-Service Education in AAC



What is the need?

- 18-35% of preservice programs do **not** offer any coursework in AAC
- Many of the programs that offer training in AAC, do so on a limited basis
 - 1-4 hours of AAC content
- 64% of programs report that faculty who are **not** experts in AAC typically teach the AAC courses
 - Light et al (2014)

 Our audience includes persons who use AAC and family members, professionals (speech language pathologists and teachers), as well as college faculty and their students


